

# EUCCHARISTIC MINISTER LICENSE

“A Eucharistic Minister is a lay person authorized to administer the Consecrated Elements at a Celebration of Holy Eucharist.” Canon III.4.6

## Required Training for Licensed Lay Ministries (Title III Canon 4: Of Licensed Ministries)

Introduction: “A confirmed communicant in good standing or, in extraordinary circumstances, subject to guidelines established by the Bishop, a communicant in good standing, may be licensed by the Ecclesiastical Authority to serve as Pastoral Leader, Worship Leader, Preacher, Eucharistic Minister, Eucharistic Visitor, or Catechist. Requirements and guidelines for the selection, training, continuing education, and deployment of such persons, and the duration of licenses shall be established by the Bishop in consultation with the Commission on Ministry.” Canon 4.1(a)

**Eucharistic Minister:** “A Eucharistic Minister is a lay person authorized to administer the Consecrated Elements at a Celebration of Holy Eucharist. A Eucharistic minister should normally act under the direction of a Deacon, if any, or otherwise, the Member of the Clergy or other leader exercising oversight of the congregation or other community of faith.” Canon III.4.6

Training for a Eucharistic Minister will include:

- Vesting
- Altar guild knowledge
- Acolyte duties
- Sacramental theology, especially Eucharistic theology
- Practical aspects of administering the elements
- Practical aspects of movement within local parish
- Preparation for service
- Public speaking
- Proper handling and disposal of elements

General information regarding licensure:

- All licenses will expire December 31 of even years.
- Applicants may attend training at any congregation in the diocese as directed by the appointed supervisor of this ministry. Churches are encouraged to open their training to persons of any congregation in the diocese. It is the sponsoring clergy person’s responsibility to ensure that the proper required training has been undertaken prior to licensure.
- Yearly continuing education is expected of all licensed ministers in consultation with his/her local priest.
- The Commission on Ministry will provide, at least annually, continuing education opportunities within the diocese for licensed lay ministers.
